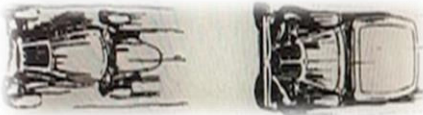

COOK'S CORNER

Cheesy Ranch Oven Roasted Potatoes

4 big russet potatoes, cubed up
¼ cup olive oil
1 packet ranch seasoning mix
1 cup shredded cheddar cheese
¼ cup Parmesan Cheese, grated
Salt and pepper to taste

Preheat Oven: Preheat oven to 400°F

Line a baking sheet with parchment paper.

In a large bowl, toss the cubed potatoes with olive oil, ranch seasoning mix, salt and pepper until coated. Spread the prepared potatoes evenly on the lined baking sheet. Roast for 25-30 minutes, flipping once or until golden brown and crispy. Sprinkle shredded cheddar cheese and Parmesan cheese over the top of the baked potato cubes. Return to the oven for another 5 minutes or until melted and bubbly.

Crock Pot Chicken and Rice Recipe

2 boneless skinless chicken breasts (cut into 1 inch pieces)
1 teaspoon minced garlic
1 teaspoon black pepper
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 onion chopped
3 cups chicken broth
1 can cream of chicken soup ((10.5 oz can))
1 1/2 cup brown rice ((uncooked))
2 cups cheddar cheese ((shredded))

Place the chicken, garlic, salt, pepper, onion, chicken broth, cream of chicken soup and brown rice in the crock pot. Stir to thoroughly combine all the ingredients.

Cover and cook on high for 3 ½ to 4 hours until the rice has absorbed all the chicken broth in the crock pot.

Stir in the shredded cheese. Cover and allow the heat from the meal to melt the cheese (5-7 minutes).

The phrase oil was poured from open, steel
pitchers" describes an outdated method of
dispensing oil, particularly prevalent before
glass bottles were widely used for oil between
1910 and 1934, and again when steel was
prioritized for other uses during WWII.



Pre-1910's: Oil was often sold and transported
in open, refillable containers, including steel
pitchers.

Post-WWII: When steel became scarce for civilian
use, glass bottles became popular, with the
expectation that they would be returned for refilling.



Around the late 1800s, inventors
like Pennsylvanian Reuben Ritter
developed innovative bottle designs, such as the "Gem"
Oiler, which served as a vessel for oil that could be
converted to an oiler by adding a
nozzle.



In 1930, Oil City Glass
Bottle the company, part of the
Knox Glass Bottle Co., opened
near Oil City and began producing various glass
containers, including those for Pennzoil motor oil.

The shops are completely equipped and have frozen in time since 1956. I was amazed with neat stuff like the press for pressing the wheels to the axles (one BIG press). Over 20 folks in all (see group photo with the steam behind us!).
