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




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COOK'S CORNER

One Pot Chicken Fajita

1 1/2 T. Olive oil

1-pound boneless, chicken breast sliced into strips 2 large bell peppers (any color) thinly sliced.

3 cloves garlic minced or ½ tsp garlic powder.

1 medium red onion thinly sliced (about 1 cup)

1 can (14.5 oz.) diced tomatoes.

1 can (4 oz.) diced green chilies or 1 can Rotel instead of tomatoes and chilies.

2 t. chili power

1 t paprika

½ t salt

½ t pepper

1 can of chicken broth.

8 oz penne pasta

1 cup shredded cheddar cheese

1/3 c cream cheese

Put chicken and olive oil in your skillet or pot and cook until browned. Add broth, peppers, garlic, onion, diced tomatoes, green chilies, chili powder, paprika, salt and pepper. Stir. Add pasta, cook until everything is cooked the way you like it. Remove from heat and stir in cream cheese. Put cheese on top and allow it to melt. Ready to eat.

Left over Ham Sliders

1 package Hawaiian rolls (12 pk) Slices of Swiss cheese (1 lb.)

Leftover ham chopped or deli ham slices (1 lb.)

Take rolls from package (keep all together). Slice in half. Put the bottom half on a baking pan. Add chopped ham on top and then slices of cheese. Next put the top half of the rolls on.

Combine:

½ cup melted butter

1 T. brown sugar

2 tsp. Mustard

1 ½ tsp Worchester sauce

1 tsp onion powder

Pour butter mixture on top of rolls. Cover with foil and bake 15 minutes at 350. Remove foil and bake another 10 minutes.

The Chrysler Imperial

In 1910 Walter P. Chrysler started out working at the Buick Motor Company. In 1916, William C. Durant, a wealthy pioneer at the head of the American auto industry, convinced Chrysler to keep working as the head of Buick for three more years by offering him a large increase in pay. Chrysler was ultimately not happy with Durant's vision for the American car industry and in 1919 he left Buick.

After a brief stint in charge of the Willys-Overland Motor Company, Chrysler gained control of the Maxwell Motor company, which in 1925 became the Chrysler Corporation. In 1926 Chrysler released its flagship model for the world to see, and the Chrysler Imperial was born.

In the year the Imperial was introduced it broke the US trans-continental speed record, crossing coast to coast in a week, and was used as the Indy 500 pace car. The first series of Imperial was proudly called the Series-80 after its ability to cruise all day at a then impressive 80 miles per hour (129km/h).

In 1931 was the start of the Chrysler Imperial 8. Powered for the first time by an eight-cylinder engine, the Imperial was now capable of nearly 100 miles per hour (161 km/h). It was in this second generation that the formula for an Imperial was set for the next half century with the large eight-cylinder engine, a massive overall size, and an engineering elegance unmatched by any other major American luxury car manufacturer.

Imperials continued to set automotive luxury and engineering standards for the next few decades. In 1934 Chrysler offered the Imperial with the Airflow body, the first production car ever designed in a wind tunnel. Rare Imperial Limousines had by now found their way not just into the hands of wealthy businessmen and world leaders.

By 1949 Imperial had become the first company in the world to offer disc brakes on their cars. In 1951 the Imperial was one of the first cars to receive the Hemihead V8. In 1952 Chrysler designed the three Chrysler Imperial Parade Phaetons. The 1954 Imperial still holds the record for widest production car ever.

By 1955 Imperial had become well established in the auto-industry, and while they would never become a household name the way Cadillac already had, Chrysler was always ahead of the competition when it came to the underlying quality and engineering prowess of their cars.

One of the major factors that had contributed to the excellence of the 1950s imperials was a new designer who had started working at Chrysler in 1949, Virgil Exner. He had designed some of the most beautiful cars in the world during the mid-to-late 50s and looked poised to remain a powerhouse car.

design industry for the sixties as well. By the end of 1962, even though Exner was against it the higher ups downsized the car designs and, in the process, ruined them. Exner, despite him being against the ideas that had gone so wrong for them, would be their scapegoat. He was promptly fired.

Chrysler hired Elwood Engel to replace Exner. The 1964 Imperial was the first Elwood Engel design. It was an instant classic and earned Imperial its second-best sales year ever. The '64 Imperial also earned high praise for its very good handling ability, something not expected for what was the largest non-limousine series-production car in the world at the time. In 1966 the legendary 440 V8 was made standard on all Imperials, and this continued until 1975.

In 1967 the Imperial really came into its own. Switching from the heavier body on chassis design of older Imperials to a lighter more advanced unibody design.

In 1967-68 for only one year Imperial offered a rare and sought-after option on the **Imperial Crown Coupe known as the Mobile Director.** The Mobile Director package was a strange creation consisting of what Chrysler thought the 'boss on the run' would need: the center armrest could be turned into wood tables over the rear seats, a high-output lamp that could be plugged into the cigarette lighter on either side of the car front and rear. Strangest of all, the front passenger seat could rotate 180° to utilize the tables and comfortably interact with the rear seat occupants. This package was only available on the coupe version of the Imperial Crown at a cost of nearly \$600. Less than 100 of these cars were produced.

For 1969 Imperial released their last great car. The 1969-73 Imperial had a series of early innovations and stand-out accomplishments. In '69, they had sequential turn signals. In '71, they were the first cars in America to be fitted with 4-wheel ABS. In '72, two black Imperials were bought by the U.S. Secret Service, and soon after were transferred to presidential use and were used until 1981. The 1973 Imperial still holds the record for longest post-war, non-limousine, 4-door production car ever made*.

Unfortunately, the Imperial introduced to replace the '73 car was not an improvement. The 70s oil crisis hit the smaller Chrysler Corporation harder than the larger GM or Ford, and Chrysler could simply not justify continuing to build such an opulent vehicle. The 74-75 Imperial at least managed to maintain some of the marque's former glory and was still described as good-looking.

Despite Chrysler's best efforts, 1975 was essentially the last year of the Imperial.

There were brief, ill-fated efforts in 1981-83 and 1990-93 to revive the brand, and an Imperial concept car in 2006, but none of these were ever fated to get off the ground.

In other buildings on the site are the National Auto & Truck Museum. Another treat while in Auburn was the Early Ford V-8 Foundation Museum just a few miles away. The 2023 Grand Nationals in Bettendorf, Iowa was another spectacular event located on the banks of the Mississippi River. The Mississippi Riverboat Dinner Cruise was a great addition to the event! In traveling, I stopped at the Model T Museum while passing through Richmond, Indiana. It is another nice museum full of Model T exhibits. Stan and Frank go car Hunting

It was in the autumn of 1954 that Stan Smith, Frank Gullo and Bob Foster took off on a plesant Friday morning for the region in and around New York City.

Frank was going to purchase a prewar Mercedes Convertible in Manhatten, Stan was going to pick up a 1928 Packard Roadster in Connecticut and Bob was planning to get a 1932 Lincoln V-8 Convertible in northern New Jersey.

We set off in Stan's 1953 Studebaker Sedan in good spirits. Frank said he really needed to get away every three months or so. It was a good change from academic life. We stopped for a rest break at Amity Hall and around noon we arrrived at the house in New Jersey where the '32 Lincoln sat. The owner was not home but the key was in it so Stan started it up. Gas gushed from the fuel pump. The car was very tatty overall. The decision was made to leave it behind all call the owner from NYC later that evening saying he was not interrested.

In early afternoon we pulled up at a warehouse at the docks in Manhattan. New Jaguar roadsters were being unloaded nearby. The owner of Frank's Mercedes had not yet arrived so we checked over the Jaguars. Waiting for Frank an attendenet started the Mercedes The car was a pathatic case gasping for air. Frank was very disappointed. When the owner showed up, Frank said he was not interested. The man was not happy at all. We drove downtown somewhere to help the nonseller on his way. Frank said as he was exiting the the car "Why don't you advertise it in the New York Times?" The guy didn't answer and slammmed the door as he left. At this point Frank had money burning a whole in his pocket so de decided to go on to Connecticut with Stan in hopes of finding a car up there. Bob was a tagalong who would ride home with Stan.

In the late afternoon we attended the New York Auto Show and then went to dinner at a place called Kern's. The rafters were lined with white clay smoking pipes. While at dinner I called the guy in New Jersey who had the '32 Lincoln and let him no I was not going to buy the car because of its condition. He was angry and replied "Well what do you expect for \$150?"

That evening Stan drove us to a friend's home north of the city where we rested confortably. The next morning we promptly travelled to Bridgeport where we met the man from whom Stan was to buy his '28 Packard. It was to be a surprise for Stan's wife as the car was very similar to one she had had many years before.

The car was indeed there and in the condition describled, which is to say was in fairly original, slightly rough condition. It had striking lines with its wire wheels and distinctive Packard design. Stan decided to take it. He planned to tour with a special hitch he brought along.

This led Frank still with no car, but he seriously considered a '32 Packard Super 8 four door convertible the man had for \$800. The engine had beed rebuilt and ran smoothly. The full leather interior, however was ratty and would require an expensive replacement. He wavered. "What would the wife say if he brought this home. He decided the answer would not be positive. He settled instead on a more modern '34 Packard standart 8 convertible coup, gray with welded over fender wells. The spare was rigged on the backend. The man said he would deliver it to State College for expenses. Frank closed the deal. He then left soon after for a conference inn the area hence he couldn't drive his new possession home himself.

Stan then atempted to hitch up his'28 but regretfully the hitch would not adapt to his car. There was no atlernative but for me to steer it all the way back to a garage nearby where it was to be sorted out in secret from Stan's wife. So with the Studebaker pulling and me steering we set off avoiding major highways where ever possible. Stan had taken the license plate off the Studebaker and hung it on the back of the Packard. Darkness found us cruising successfully along the boulevards of NYC –until a policeman pulled Stan over and asked for papers. Having no proper registration, he was asked to come down to the police station. Everyone was very cordial including Stan. The officers admired the graceful lines of the Packard as it sat beneath teh street lights outside the pollice station. Still, Stan Stan was not left without a fine. It was paid and we were on our way again.

It was very breezy atop the George Washington bridge. The rag top flapped wildly. I clung on using some gloved Stan had found. It was really chilly by now. After what seemed forever, Stan pulled up in the darkness at a small dark garage and left the Packard. I stumbled on to the back seat of the Studebaker and fell into a deep sleep. It was about 2 a.m. Around 7 a.m. we re-entered State Colege. Stan had stamina, I must confess. We were weary and perhaps wiser.

Frank's '34 Packard arrrived via the former owner. Frank soon placed it for sale at Bathhursts Gulf Station for \$300 or \$400. The manager of the old diner near the present Old College Diner eventually bought it. As for Stan's Packard a mechanic near Reading got it started and it sounded like a thrashing machine. The car got to State College and rested in peace for some time. Stan knows the rest of the story as my story ends here.

We gather at 6:00 and order at 6:30.



TWO MORE DUESEY'S

In the last VAPOR LOCKS, I listed what new classic era cars were owned by central Penna folk that included a few Duesenberg's. Here are two more that our late club member Jack Metzgar of Alexandria recalled & told me about.

Have you ever seen a new Duesenberg with a bumper sticker? There was a four passenger Coupe in State College that wore something worse — on the back of the trunk was W8CMP - the owner's ham radio station call letters.

He was Professor Eugene C. Woodruff who taught at the Penn State Electrical Engineering Department and one of his hobbies was amateur radio. His interest started in the early 1900's and later while living in State College he set up a radio lab facility at his home for himself and his students.

By the mid 1920's he became head chairman of American Radio Relay League and was always on call to be a speaker at almost all their conventions. He along with his blue/silver Duesenberg would be seen in almost every state of the Union. "Doc Woodruff" with his bag o' tricks" had become the highlight of each session.

Having an automobile and driving was another passion – he had owned 23 cars since 1908 and had driven across the USA at least 25 times. His sister lived in California and from reading a letter he wrote requesting a rebuild of his J-333 Duesenberg in November 1936 one can see that a lot of miles were put on it.

The letter asked for the following:

- 1. All wheel's need trued up with spokes replaced. One rim replaced.
- 2. Body to chassis needs revamping. Bolts tightened or replaced.
- 3. Doors rattle badly. Bad roads cause front wheels to shimmy.
- 4. Headlights need going over with one needing glass.
- 5. The engine throws oil out of the right vent all over body and windshield.
- 6. Hand throttle sticks can be moved only a little bit.
- 7. Car needs a paint job. Body, engine, and chassis. Refurbish canvas.
- 8. Valves need reground and carbon removed.

Professor Woodruff bought the Duesenberg as a 60th birthday present and it is not known if he still owned the car when he died of a heart attack in 1944. J-333 is still with us as part of the late Al Ferrara Car Collection in Ohio.

At some point in the late 1920's Professor Woodruff was lent a Model J Duesenberg touring that he drove while assisting in the upgrading of the electrical system of the Lycoming engine. This experience must have led him into buying one for himself. As I've noted in the past it would be great to see photos of either of the two Duesenberg's while they were in the State College area. Photography was another interest of his so I'm sure a photo or two are in a Woodruff family album.
