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COOK'S CORNER

Caramel Apple Dump Cake

3 – 21 oz. Cans Apple Pie Filling

1 box Spice cake mix, or vanilla cake mix mixed with 1 tsp. pumpkin pie spice.

12 T butter cut into ¼ inch slices.

½ C chopped pecans

½ C Caramel sauce

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Coat a 9x13 inch baking dish with cooking spray Spread apples in an even layer on the bottom of dish. Sprinkle cake mix evenly over the apples and top with butter slices. Scatter pecans on top and transfer to oven.

Bake for 45-50 minutes or until golden brown and bubbling.

Remove from oven and cool slightly.

Drizzle with caramel sauce and serve. Delicious with ice cream

Apple Turnovers

2 sheets of puff pastry thawed according to package instructions.

1 T flour

3 medium Granny Smith apples peeled cored and diced in 1/3" thick pieces.

1 T unsalted butter

¹/₄ C. Brown sugar lightly packed

½ tsp. cinnamon

1/8 tsp. salt1 egg + 1 T water for egg wash

Glaze: ½ c. powdered sugar

1-2 T heavy whipping cream or milk

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Remove puff pastry from freezer and thaw according to

directions.

In a medium pot, melt 1 T butter, and apples then cook until soft. Reduce heat to low and stir in brown sugar, cinnamon, and salt. Continue simmering for 3 minutes. Remove from heat and set aside to cool. Use a rolling pin roll the first sheet of thawed pastry to an 11" square. With a pizza cutter, cut into 4 equal-sized squares. Place cooled apple mixture over half of each square, leaving at least a 1/2" border. Beat the egg wash and brush lightly on the edges. Bring edges together and crimp tightly with a fork. Repeat with the second sheet of pastry. Transfer to a parchment-lined baking sheet, keeping them at least 1" apart. Cut 2-3 small slits on the top of each turnover. Brush the tops with egg wash and bake 20-23 minutes or until golden and puffed.

While the turnovers are still warm, stir together powdered sugar and heavy whipping cream (adding to your desired consistency) and drizzle glaze over turnovers.

Cruising And Playing the Radio By Phillip Cole Vice President - Publications

Maybe it was Chuck Berry who best described the joy of driving an automobile when he sang, "Cruising and playing the radio. With no particular place to go." In the early 1990s I tried to describe "cruising and playing the radio" to a visiting English friend, but he couldn't comprehend it. It was Friday night. So, we walked the few blocks from my house to downtown Lincolnton, N.C. where there were hundreds of teenagers cruising in their cars. This prompted two questions from the Englishman: "What is the purpose of all this?" and "Why do they play their radios so loud?" When I tried to explain that it was a unique part of American culture thanks to "freedom of the road", he smiled and said, "Well, all these young people sure seem to be enjoying themselves!"

I grew up "cruising and playing the radio". The year I was born was when the 45-rpm record was introduced by RCA Victor. The year I learned to drive the 8- track player was becoming the big thing. I still have a box of 8-track tapes in the garage, but the player hanging under the dash is long gone.

Let's share some main events in our history of cruising and playing the radio:

- --In the 1920s and 1930s in-car radios were being introduced. They were expensive, adding about 25% to the price of a Model A. The top song of 1930 was "Happy Days Are Here Again".
- --In 1952, even though practically all stations were broadcasting in AM, the first in-car FM radio became available thanks to Blaupunkt. The top song was "Blue Tango".
- --In 1963 car radios became "solid state". The top song was "Surfin' USA".
- --In 1965 8-track players became available. Over the next several years 8-track players were added to many cars. The top song was "Wooly Bully".
- --By 1969 cars added stereo to their sound system, where the tuner amplified two channels, not just one. The top song was "Sugar, Sugar".
- --In 1970 companies like Alpine and Pioneer sought to solve our problem of the 8-track player eating up the tape with cassette tapes. With the advent of cassette tapes, we could now play "my music" thanks to a "Mix Tape". The top song was "Bridge Over Troubled Waters".




By 1982 Bose offered the first Premium Stereo System teaming up with GM's Delco to offer it as an option in Oldsmobiles, Buicks, and Cadillacs. The top song was "Physical".

By 1984 Sony introduced an in-dash CD player. The top song was "Careless Whisper". Now, buttons and dials have been replaced by touch screens and Bluetooth. If you don't know what that is, ask your grandchildren. Then, take them on a cruise in your "old car". If it has a radio, let them turn it up loud.

Swigart Museum Temporary Headquarters for the AACA - 1957-1959

The recent "Speedster", an online newsletter from the Antique Automobile Club of America, carried information on a new document to the AACA library.

Pat Swigart, CEO of Swigart Automobile Museum, presented the AACA's club's very first stationery. The letter is signed by AACA's first Vice President, Earle S. Eckel, and was sent to Mr. W. E. Swigart in 1946.

William Swigart was very active in the early years of the AACA, at one point being president of the group.

Reviewing the history of the AACA, using their digital publications, the information found stated that the organization began in 1935 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and was in Philadelphia until 1959, when it moved to the basement of the Hershey Museum.

In a 1995 interview by a local Harrisburg, Pa., newspaper of William H. Smith, then director of the AACA, he stated that up until 1959 the organization had no official permanent home, with all business correspondence sent to an office in Philadelphia. He stated in the interview that the ACCA officially moved to Hershey Museum in 1959, remaining there until 1971, when the permanent home was on Governor Road.

This leads up to the question, why does AACA history not mention that for a short period of time the AACA National Headquarters were not in Philadelphia or Hershey? But for a two-year period, the National Headquarters were temporarily located at the Swigart Automobile Museum in Huntingdon, Pennsylvania.

In 1957 the AACA Board of Directors agreed at the Annual Meeting to have the Swigart Automobile Museum be the temporary headquarters from 1957 to 1959. Of note in 1957, William Swigart constructed, in its current location, a new building to house his family's automobile collection started in the 1920s.

The AACA magazine for February 1958, indicated that the Board of Directors consented to have Swigart's be the temporary National Headquarters, with the Swigart staff assisting the AACA.

The December 1959, Antique Automobile magazine indicated memberships be sent to Swigart's (Museum). Also, the period publications carried advertisements for AACA memorabilia and magazine back issues available from the Swigart Automobile Museum.

Temporary Headquarters con't

Imagine if fate would have been different, the Antique Automobile Club may have been located in Huntingdon and be the home too of the Allegheny Region.

This information was passed on to the National Office, but to date no response as to why the Swigart is not included in the historic background of the AACA.

The Famous Iowa 80 Truck Stop



A place where people want to stop. On the eastern edge of Iowa, not far from the Mississippi River, adjacent to the small town of Walcott, you'll find a place like no other in the world. The Iowa 80 Truckstop, now the World's Largest Truckstop, established its home here in 1964 and is now in itself a home away from home to countless drivers and a destination for travelers as well. Some say Iowa 80 Truckstop is like a small city, others have likened it to a Trucker's Disneyland, all can agree it is a place not to be missed.

Iowa 80 Truckstop began serving truckers out of a small white enamel building in 1964 before Interstate 80 was completely built. Bill Moon, a regional manager for Standard Oil was Iowa 80 founder, located the spot, at what is now Exit 284, for Standard Oil. They built and opened the truck stop with Bill taking direct control in 1965.

Years passed, Interstate 80 was completed and hundreds, then thousands of truckers and travelers stopped by Iowa 80 to fuel, grab a bite to eat and head on down the road. In 1984, Standard Oil (now Amoco) decided to sell the facility. Bill Moon, who had been managing the place for nearly 20 years, jumped at the chance. He and his wife Carolyn leveraged everything they had, including borrowing money from friends, to purchase Iowa 80.

Once the Moon Family-owned Iowa 80, they could expand the building and add services as needed. Bill loved everything about trucks and trucking, he loved to sit at the counter in the restaurant and talk to drivers about what would make their life easier if Iowa 80 had it. He truly enjoyed the truck stop business and all the people he encountered."

In 1992, the year of Moon's death, it became a <u>Travel Centers of America</u> franchise, though the facility is still owned and operated by the second generation of the Moon family
