Coca-Cola

On May 8, 1886, Dr. John Pemberton sold the first glass of Coca-Cola at Jacobs' Pharmacy in downtown Atlanta. Serving

nine drinks per day in its first year, Coca-Cola was new refreshment in its beginning.

In **July 1886**, pharmacist John Stith Pemberton from Columbus, Georgia, invented the original Coca-Cola drink, which was advertised as helpful in the relief of headaches and to be placed on sale primarily in drugstores as a medicinal beverage.^[6] Pemberton had made many mixing experiments and reached his goal during the month of May, but the new product was as yet unnamed and uncarbonated Pemberton's bookkeeper, Frank Mason Robinson, is credited with naming the product and creating its logo. Robinson chose the name Coca-Cola because of its two main ingredients (coca leaves and kola nuts) and because it is an alliteration. John Pemberton had taken a break and left Robinson to make, promote, and sell Coca-Cola on his own. Robinson promoted the drink with the limited budget that he had and succeeded.^[1]

American businessman Asa Griggs Candler purchased the Coca-Cola formula and brand, forming the Coca-Cola Company in Atlanta in 1892. By 1895, Coca-Cola was being sold nationwide.^[10] In 1919, the company was sold to Ernest Woodruff's Trust Company of Georgia, after which it was soon reincorporated under the Delaware General Corporation Law that same year.

Coca-Cola's first ad read, "Coca-Cola. Delicious! Refreshing! Exhilarating! Invigorating!"^[1]

~Making The Ask~

If you attended the Eastern Fall National Meet in Hershey, PA you may have noticed that the Public Address (P.A.) system was put to good use during the Flea Market to gently solicit new memberships and renewals.

It was an old school; proactive measure used in sales and fundraising that's referred to as "Making the Ask." Making the Ask involves consciously asking for the purchase or commitment after establishing rapport by personally engaging with the prospect or audience... thereby gaining insight into their interests and understanding their desires. Garnering an opportunity to simply make the ask means that you have already generated enough AACA interest and awareness to attract participants to your events and activities. So, the stage has been set.

Simply leaving membership applications on a table and expecting enthusiasts to gobble them up is not enough. Take passive tactics and actively rev them up by injecting personal energy into the process, use all the tools at your disposal to do so. Like a P.A. system if one's available. Maybe new members aren't joining because they're not being asked? So don't be shy, be the one to...ask! And don't be put off by rejection, it's a normal part of the process. Speaking from experience, you might even have a bit of fun in the process. Ask me how I know!
