Zucchini Onion Pie

3 eggs

1 cup grated Parmesan cheese

1/2 c canola oil

1 T Minced Fresh parsley

1 garlic clove minced

1/4 tsp. salt

1/8 tsp. pepper

3 cups sliced zucchini

1 cup Biscuit/Baking Mix

1 small onion chopped

In a large bowl, whisk the first seven ingredients. Stir in the zucchini, baking mix and onion. Pour into a greased 9-in. deep dish pie pan. Bake at 350° for 25-35 minutes or until lightly browned.

Caramel Apple Strudel Bars

1 can (8oz.) refrigerated Crescent Dough sheet

3 Cups chopped peeled cooking apples

1/2 cup caramel topping

1/2 cup butter or margarine softened

1/4 cup flour

3/4 cup packed brown sugar

1/2 cup flour

1/2 cup quick cooking oats

1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

1/2 cup chopped pecans (optional)

Heat oven to 375°. Spray 13x9 inch baking dish with cooking spray. Unroll dough; press in bottom and 1/2 inch up sides. Place apples over dough

In a 1-qt. saucepan, heat caramel topping and 1/4 cup flour to boiling over medium heat, stirring constantly. Boil 1 minute stirring constantly until thickened. Drizzle over apples.

In a medium bowl, mix brown sugar, flour, oats and cinnamon. Cut in butter until crumbly. Add pecans. Sprinkle evenly over apples.

Bake 18 to 22 minutes or until top is golden brown and apples are tender.

The word streusel is German for "sprinkle" or "strew".


Potomac Eagle Scenic Railroad

LOCAL LORE

Moller Motor Company – (Part Two)

In my last LOCAL LORE there was mention of my owning a blueprint of the drawing for the first line of Moller Motor Cars. It shows the design for the Roadster body that was the early work of Raymond H. Dietrich in NYC. It was just before he began his styling, building and showing his talent with three Packard's in the mid 1920's. The Packard Company saw what he did and had him rebody 175 cars in 1926. Lincoln then hired him as a styling consultant which was followed by Dodge and Studebaker. Franklin had him design the 1927-29 Pirate Series for them.

Later in the mid 1930's he became a fixture in the Chrysler Corporation where one job was to redesign the grilles of the Chrysler and Desoto Airflows.

The photos show the Moller Roadsters as they were just being finished using Mr. Ray Dietrich's drawings. Note that for some reason there's a 1920 NY license plate on one front of one of the Roadsters. The rearview photo of the second Roadster shows it was RHD and meant to be shipped overseas. That follows suit the original intent of the Moller Brothers was to have their car exported. In the first year of production they had orders from Africa, Australia, Brazil, Denmark, England and Sweden. There's a photo showing them being crated for shipment from Lewistown.


No records exist for just how many cars were made. An article in a 1970 Lewistown newspaper on Moller claims there were a thousand. When Moller stopped producing cars in 1923 the 2-story building adjacent to the Chestnut





Street Station of the PA Railroad was then occupied by Belmont Motors Corporation who made trucks. Their slogan was "ANY LOAD on ANY ROAD".

To the best of my knowledge there are no Moller cars or Belmont trucks existing.



The Plymouth Road Runner

The **Plymouth Road Runner** was a mid-size car with a focus on performance built by Plymouth between 1968 and 1980. By 1968, some of the original muscle cars were moving away from their roots as relatively cheap, fast cars as they



gained features and increased in price. Plymouth developed the Road Runner to market a lower priced, basic trim model to its upscale GTX.

Plymouth paid \$50,000 to Warner Bros.-Seven Arts to use the Road Runner name and likeness from their Wile E. Coyote and The Road Runner cartoons (as well as a "beep, beep" horn, which Plymouth paid \$10,000 to develop). The Road Runner was based on the Chrysler B platform (the same as the Belvedere and Satellite), as a back-to-basics mid-size performance car.

The earliest of the 1968 models were available only as 2-door pillared coupes (with a B-pillar between the front and rear windows), but later in the model year a 2-door "hardtop" model (sans pillar) was offered. The Road Runner of 1968-1970 was based on the Belvedere, while the GTX was based on the Sport Satellite, a car with higher level trim and slight differences in the grilles and taillights.

The interior had a basic vinyl bench seat, lacking even carpets in early models, and few options were available — such as power steering, front disc brakes, AM radio, air conditioning (except with the 426 Hemi) and automatic transmission. A floor-mounted shifter (for the four-speed) featured only a rubber boot and no console so that a bench seat could be used.

The standard engine was an exclusive "Roadrunner" 383 cu in (6.3 L) B-series V8 engine with a 4-barrel Carter Carburetor.

The standard equipment transmission was a 4-speed manual transmission with floor shifter and the three-speed Torque Flite automatic transmission was optional. Early 1968 Road Runners four-speeds featured Inland shifters, which were replaced by Hurst shifters during the course of the model year.

Plymouth expected to sell about 20,000 units in 1968; actual sales numbered around 45,000. This placed the Road Runner third in sales among muscle cars with only the Pontiac GTO and Chevy's SS-396 Chevelle outselling it. Dodge debuted the Road Runner's cousin, the Super Bee, as a mid-1968 offering after seeing Plymouth's success with the Road Runner.

Rain-X and the Inventor

Howard G. Ohlhausen of the Unelko Corporation introduced Rain-x a synthetic hydrophobic surface-applied product that causes water to bead, most commonly used on glass automobile surfaces in 1972.

Howard immigrated to the U.S. in 1939 with his mother and brother at age 7. Their family fled Nazi Germany to find safety. His father

Arthur, after surviving years in a German concentration camp, was safely brought to the states, where the family was reunited in Chicago, IL.

Howard worked very hard at a young age, in times that were difficult as an immigrant with little or no means. He was driven to learn and master the English language early on, which allowed him to excel in school. He attended Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa. After college he joined the Air Force, wanting to serve the country that he felt brought his family to safety as a child. He graduated from officer's candidate school as a second lieutenant and was assigned as an Aircraft Observer – Navigator and, with advanced training, ultimately as an Air Electronic Countermeasures Officer (the single most needed rating in the entire Air Force). It was there that he identified the need to develop a means to improve visibility in flying aircraft during inclement weather.

It wasn't long, until Howard's inventor side came out. His experiences in the Air Force led him to create a small laboratory, allowing him to experiment with coatings and water repellants that would allow aircraft to achieve better visibility and safety. After years of testing, he invented and patented several ultra-thin "polymer" coatings that rendered glass and other surfaces to become water and soil repellent. He trademarked "Repcon" which was ultimately sold to the U.S. Air Force. Then came the brand **Rain-X** "the Invisible Windshield Wiper" and so a new chapter in his journey began.

He moved his family to Scottsdale, AZ in 1981, where Howard and his three sons continued to commit their lives to building the new family business and ultimately the incredible product "Rain-X" became a global automotive brand.

The brand has since been extended to a range of automotive and surface care products, including wiper blades. Ownership of Rain-X was sold to Quaker State in 1997. Between 1997 and 2011 rain-X was marketed by **SOPUS Products**, a subsidiary of **Pennzoil-Quaker State**, itself a subsidiary of **Royal Dutch Shell**.

It is currently owned by ITW Global Brands.
