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So, What's My Car Worth?

For those of us who collect cars, the value of the car is always important. We don't want to overpay and certainly do not want to part with a car for a bar-gain price.

So, what are our choices for determining value? There are many appraisers that will give you their

estimate of value for a few hundred dollars. Most of these "guesses" come from a value guide or auction results.

The value guides are often published by insurance companies. But be careful, that high insurance estimate also works to generate a higher insurance premium.

Auction results are unpredictable. Not only are bids determined by the number of bidders but also the majority of the seller listing agreements allow for "phantom" bidding by the auction company.

This is done to guarantee that the reserve price is met. But the real answer to the question is "your car is worth what someone else will pay for it." Unfortunately, with fewer people entering the old car hobby, you should be concerned about the future value of your car.

A neighbor of mine has a late 30's Packard Sedan for sale. All six of the prospective buyers who looked at this car were over the age of seventy.

It is time for each member and each region to begin a diligent effort to attract new members. We need to sell the "fun" that is available with our hobby.

More activities, such as shows, tours, and picnics, will always generate more members. Our cars need to be seen by the public.

We need to seek venues to display our cars, such as county fairs or antique malls. We have a great hobby in which small minorities of car owners participate. The best way to solidify the value of your collection is to increase our membership.

I hope the day doesn't come when no one wants an antique car.

Dump and Bake Summer Pasta

2 cups diced, cooked chicken1 cup halved grape tomatoes (can substitute with a can of undrained diced tomatoes)

small zucchini (about 1 cup), diced
 cup corn kernels (fresh, canned, or frozen is fine)
 ounces (about 3 cups) uncooked penne pasta
 '2 cups low-sodium chicken broth
 ounces about 2 cups shredded mozzarella cheese, divided
 teaspoons minced garlic
 teaspoon salt

Preheat oven to 425°. Spray a 9 x 13-inch baking dish with cooking spray.

Stir together cooked chicken, tomatoes, zucchini, corn, uncooked pasta, chicken broth, $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups of mozzarella cheese, minced garlic, and salt. Cover the dish tightly with foil and bake for 40 minutes.

Uncover; stir. At this point you should check the pasta to make sure that it is al dente (firm but just about finished cooking). If it's still too hard, cover the dish and return to the oven until pasta is al dente. Then move on to the next step.

Sprinkle remaining ½ cup of mozzarella over the top. Bake uncovered for 5-10 more minutes (or until cheese is melted and pasta is tender). Garnish with remaining basil leaves just before serving.

Easy Peasy Fresh Strawberry Pie

graham cracker pie shell
 small box of vanilla instant pudding
 8 oz. container whipped topping
 qt. fresh strawberries sliced (more or less to taste)

Mix pudding with only 1 1/4 C milk (Not 2 cups) Add 1/2 of whipped topping.

Layer some pudding then strawberries and repeat until you run out of ingredients ending with strawberries. Put the other half whipped topping on top and you are done. Refrigerate until served.

Have you ever owned an "Opel"



The Opel GT

One day while in quarantine Bill and I went for a drive on some unfamiliar back roads. We were just enjoying the drive and the scenery and then there it was sitting just off the road an "old car". We drove a little further when I told Bill to stop and back up so I could get a couple of pictures of the Opel. I have done a little research and found the following information.

The Opel GT was a front-engine, rear-drive two-seat sports car manufactured and marketed by Opel in two generations — separated by a 34-year hiatus. The first generation Opel GT (1968 -1973) debuted as a styling exercise in 1965 at the Paris and Frankfurt motor shows.

The GT was a fastback, that has neither an externally accessible trunk nor a conventional hatchback. There is a parcel shelf behind the seats that can only be accessed through the main doors. Behind the parcel shelf is a fold-up panel that conceals a spare tire and jack.

One unusual feature of the Opel GT is the operation of the pop-up and down headlights. They were manually operated, by way of a large lever along the center console next to the shifter. Unlike most pop-up headlights, they both rotate in the same direction (counterclockwise from inside the car) about a longitudinal axis.

During 1968 to 1973, a total of 103,463 cars were sold. The most collectible GTs are probably the first few hundred hand-assembled in 1968 and the 1968–1970 models with the 1.1 L engine, which totaled 3,573 cars.
