

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

The 1951 Mercury 4-door & its companion models were most notable for the new integrated tail lights and the new wraparound back window which were more appropriate for the styling. 157,648 4-doors were sold, once again outselling the 2-door.

The big news for 1951 was the availability of the optional "Merc-O-Matic Drive," a fully automatic transmission. Approximately one in every three 1951 Mercury's were sold with an automatic transmission. In 1951, Mercury's came in first at two NASCAR Grand National races.

A new grille that was integrated with the signal lights was a styling change for 1951. New lower rear quarter panel stainless trim was added, and it made the wrap around bumper appear to extend even further than before.

Standard equipment was similar to 1950 and included: cigarette lighter, electric clock, locking glove compartment, twin horns, two sun visors, arm rests on each front door, foot control for headlights with beam indicator on instrument panel, two ashtrays in rear compartment, friction-lock, ventilating windows in front, dimming control for instrument lights, luggage compartment light, spare wheel and tire in luggage compartment. Power window lifts and seat adjustment were standard on the six-passenger convertible and available at extra cost on all models but the station wagon.

The 1951 Mercury 2-door was good-looking and well-proportioned. Over 142,000 were sold. 1951 Mercury Station Wagon sales jumped to 3,812 units. The Mercury Convertible maintained reasonable sales at 6,759. The Station Wagon sales jumped to 3,812 units, though the car was little different from the '50 model.

Flight 93 Memorial Chapel (that we visited)

At the intersection of Coleman Station and Stutzmantown roads, a few miles from where United Airlines Flight 93 plunged to the ground, stands one man's testament to the crew and passengers onboard.

It is not part of the official observances but the Rev. Alphonse Mascherino's Flight 93 Memorial Chapel in Stony Creek Township shows how one man's vision can sprout like a mustard seed. Mascherino had grand plans for the abandoned chapel from the moment he saw its "for sale" sign about a month after the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks. The tiny building had been





dedicated as a house of worship in 1902 and was used as a Lutheran Church until 1969. It later became a seed storage building. It needed a lot of work but the Rev. Mascherino, who lived in Somerset; saw it as an opportunity to create a place of reflection for those touched by the heroism on Flight 93.

With only about \$300, a collection of antiques and coins and an enormous amount of faith, he was able to secure a loan to open the nondenominational chapel, a museum of sorts where today everything from photos of the crash to memorabilia from the victims' families is displayed. Mascherino planned to chip away at his memorial project for as long as it took. Whenever he'd save up \$50, he'd drive to the local 84 Lumber store, hand a worker a list of items he needed, and ask for \$50 worth. After a few trips, folks at 84 Lumber began asking questions. Unbeknownst to him, someone from the company began scouting out the chapel and what was going on. Impressed, the company kicked in \$23,000 for supplies and later decided to take over what turned into a \$150,000 renovation project, getting the work done in 10 days, in time for a Sept. 11, 2002, ceremony. Volunteers, many of whom heard about the project travelled from as far away as 50 miles to pitch in.

"Unfortunately, (the chapel) is not part of the national memorial, but it's something that's become important not only to the local people there, but to family members of the heroes on Flight 93.

Rev. Mascherino passed away in 2013 at the age of 69.

The 1951 Country Squire

Did you ever own one of these?

The Country Squire was the premium station wagon for Ford and always featured real- or imitation-wood trim on the doors and tailgate.

As a full-size wagon, it could carry up to 8 passengers with the unique dual-facing rear



seats option which was fitted in the cargo area, as opposed to the usual rearfacing seat.

The Country Squire was the iconic top of the line American family wagon. It was based on the Custom Deluxe series in 1951. The Country Squire was a "woodie". Actual wood was used on the sides until the mid-1950s.

At the start of the 1950's, automakers were rushing all-steel station wagons to market, cars without so much as a matchstick's worth of wood on them as a clear signal to customers that "wood" was a thing of the past. Ford, too, was preparing to embrace the new trend.

But just as the last of the genuine "woodies" was about to depart the scene, Ford brought out a wagon decorated with big swatches of simulated wood. Reserved for its plushest and most-expensive hauler, the look preserved the old image of the wagon as plaything for the leisure class but with no loss of modern convenience. Plus, Ford kept at it year after year.

As the consistent leader in the wagon market, its successes were bound to be imitated by rivals. In time, most every other brand that offered wagons had one with wood grain decals on its sides.

The 41-year production run of the Country Squire is the third-longest of a Ford car nameplate in North America.

COOK'S CORNER

Apple Waffles

2 cups biscuit/baking mix

2 teaspoons ground cinnamon

1 teaspoon ground nutmeg

2 large eggs, room temperature

1-1/2 cups 2% milk

6 tablespoons butter, melted

1 cup chopped peeled apple



Preheat waffle maker. In a large bowl, combine biscuit mix, cinnamon and nutmeg. In another bowl, whisk eggs, milk and butter; stir into dry ingredients just until moistened; stir in apple. Bake waffles according to manufacturer's directions until golden brown. If desired, sprinkle with powdered sugar or serve with whipped cream, syrup and additional chopped apples.

Apple Crunch Salad

8 cups chopped romaine lettuce

1 or 2 Honeycrisp apples, cored cut into matchsticks

3 cup chopped toasted walnuts

1/3 cup dried cranberries

1/3 cup crumbled feta cheese, plus more to taste

Dressing

1/4 cup olive oil

2 Tbsp. apple cider vinegar

2 Tbsp. maple syrup

2 tsp. Dijon mustard

Salt and black pepper, to taste

In a large bowl, toss lettuce with desired amount of dressing. Add apples, walnuts, cranberries, and feta. Drizzle more dressing, if desired, and toss to coat. Taste for salt and pepper. Serve immediately.

Pontiac Memories

My Aunt Mary was the first one in our family to graduate from college in 1927. She was a high school social studies teacher and was always a frugal person. She lived with my Father and Grandfather. In late 1931, when the 1932 models came out, she bought a black 1931 Pontiac 6 two door sedan. In late 1937, she bought another black Pontiac 6 two door sedan but this one had a radio in addition to a heater. She now lived in her own house with a small garage. Like many



garages in those days, the doors had been removed as cars were too long to fit inside. In 1941 and 1947 she again bought new Pontiac 6 two door sedans. The 1947 was dark gray, a car I remember well. In 1954 the Pontiac with 89,000 miles was not running well. The dealer only had two leftovers, both Star Chiefs which were too long.

A fellow teacher's husband was a Dodge dealer and in November 1954 he had a large selection of leftovers as 1954 was a slow year for car sales and the 1955 Dodge was an entirely new model. Mary splurged, and got an extremely good deal on a 1954 Dodge Coronet with a 241 cu in Hemi V8, Power Flite, four-door, light gray top, dark metallic blue bottom and wheel covers. The family was surprised to see Mary get such a nice car. In mid-1960 the Dodge, with only 52,000, miles needed a valve job costing \$100 and she wanted another Pontiac, but Pontiac's would not fit in the garage. Ramblers were very popular and Mary visited a dealer who only had a few 1960 leftovers and she bought a four-door dark brown sedan. I thought it was ugly. For the first two years she was happy with the Rambler but then things began to break that didn't normally break on cars---the driver's seat back, a window crank mechanism, and in 1964 the metal that held the front shocks on had metal fatigue with one completely breaking away.

She went back to the Pontiac dealer who had a 1964 Tempest four-door sedan, 326 V8, automatic, power steering/brakes, light metallic turquoise. Mary was very happy with the Tempest which was her final car and lasted her more than ten years.



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

Bedford Springs 1951

70 years ago our Allegheny Mountain Region was formed at a meeting in the Bedford Springs Hotel. It was attended by 50 old car enthusiasts 16 of which included their wives. Each member was asked to contribute \$2.00 for the year and of those who organized the club 44 were appointed to serve on committees such as Awards, Publicity Membership, Finance, Technical and Ladies Activities. William E. Swigart, Jr. was chairman of the meeting.

William E. Swigart was later elected as Director of the Region, Mr. William A. Huff was to be the Secretary-Treasurer and S. Howard Brown as Chief Judge.

That took place February 2nd, 1951 and during the last weekend of April there was a car show. That was the Region's first car show and had at least 20 antique and classics parked at the driveway circle in front of the Hotel.

My parents drove down in their 1929 duPont Speedster and took me along. Being a fairly long drive it would have proven to be most

uncomfortable for me, a 12 year old, to sit in her lap. The solution was that I sat in the trunk....luckily for me it had been built to be a rumble seat but not finished by the custom body builder before being sold. No upholstery plus the lid opened the wrong way so my whole trip to and from Bedford was done with the lid in my face. But it was worth it.

Dad had taken me to other AACA shows as far back as 1948. Most were held in and around Philadelphia. One frequent Fall Meet was at a horse race track in Devon, PA. It occurred for a number of years and was eventually replaced by Hershey in the mid 1950's. But I'll always recall the Bedford Show since it had one unique car show up driven by a Mr. E.G. Studebaker. There were Packards, Rolls Royces, and cars with lots of brass on them that would be worthy of photographing.

I had my Brownie camera and still have the only picture I took which was Mr. Studebaker's entry......a bronze colored custom bodied Cord named the PHANTOM CORSAIR.

That car certainly started my career on wanting to know more about car design and the engineering behind what was under the stylish body. I immediately starting drawing what I thought future cars should look like and still like to sketch an idea with a pencil on paper. The Bedford Car Show was the turning point in my career to become a design engineer with the hopes of working for one the big three US Automobile Companies. I came close since my mother sent off some of my drawings to their styling studios. I actually had one person from Chrysler stop at our house to encourage me to keep plugging away.

Here's hoping our Allegheny Mountain Region car shows and the Swigart Museum give our youth inspiration to get into an engineering/styling career like it did for me.
