The Split-In-Two Super Safe Hudson Called 'Sir Vival'

In 1958, Walter Jerome of Worchester, MA decided it was about time somebody built a car designed primarily for safety and not for looks or speed.

It was his mission to make the world's safest car. In the end, he failed to advance auto safety, but Jerome's segmented sedan might easily qualify as the world's strangest car.

Primarily concerned with head-on collisions, Jones split his car in two, hoping the front section would absorb collisions, leaving the passenger cabin untouched. Using a heavily modified 1948 Hudson sedan as a rear section, he built a raised turret to provide the driver with maximum visibility, a goal he furthered with a 360-degree wrap-around screen that constantly rotated past built-in squeegees to wipe it clean.

Wrap-around rubber bumpers protected the Sir Vival's bodywork from errant motorists in slow speed collisions, but they were just one of Jerome's innovations. The Sir Vival was years ahead with seat belts, a padded interior, and built-in roll bars.

COOK'S CORNER RECIPES



Pina Colada Icebox Cake

- 1 8 oz package cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup confectioners' sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon rum extract
- 1 can (13.66 ounces) coconut milk, divided
- 1 package (3.4 ounces) instant vanilla pudding mix
- 1 container (8 ounces) frozen whipped topping, thawed
- 15 whole graham crackers
- 1 can (20 ounces) crushed pineapple, drained
- 1 cup sweetened shredded coconut, toasted

•

- In a large bowl, beat cream cheese, confectioners' sugar and extract until smooth. Gradually beat in 1 cup coconut milk. Add pudding mix; beat on low speed until smooth. Fold in whipped topping.
- Pour remaining coconut milk into a shallow dish. Quickly dip half of the graham crackers into milk; allow excess to drip off. Arrange in a single layer in the bottom of a 13x9-in. baking dish, breaking to fit as needed. Layer with half each of the cream cheese mixture, pineapple, and coconut. Repeat layers. Refrigerate, covered, at least 4 hours before serving.

Frozen Peach Mocktail

- 1 ½ cups fresh or frozen peaches peeled and pitted, about the equivalent of 3 peaches
- 2 tablespoon sugar
- 1 cup ice cubes
- 1 ¼ cups club soda
- Fresh thyme for garnish
- Into a blender, add the peaches, sugar, and ice cubes. Blend until completely combined.
- Add the club soda and blend until combined.
- Pour into champagne glasses and top with a couple of sprigs of fresh thyme, if desired.

The Family's 1922 Model T Coupe. By George Drobnock

On 3 June 2022, the Family's 1922 Model T Coupe turned 100.

Sold in Mount Union by Charles Huston Brother, Ford Dealer for Huntingdon County. The car's registration number (aka VIN) indicates that on 3 June 1922 the car left Detroit, as shipped to Pittsburgh and then to the new (as of January 1921) Dealership building on Shirley Street in Mount Union. Currently the Building is a Dollar Store.



The car was acquired by Valentine Flasher of Black Log. My father purchased the car in 1958 and rebuilt to motor transmission. He kept the car maintained and then passed it on to my sister Pat.

In 2017, a private attempt was made to have the car listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Interesting that with in the national register moving objects - trains, airplanes, ships, and even tanks can be on the national register including automobiles. To date there are no automobiles on the NPS National Register of

Historic Places. As a side note, the state of Indiana has the Founder of the Cole Motor Company's home on the National Register of Historic places, and in the garage, as part of the nomination is a 1925 Cole Bourette .

Although there is a list through an insurance company that has its own private listing. The nomination was reviewed by the Pennsylvania Historical Commission and the National Park Service for the National Register, but neither was committed to accept the vehicle. Yet on a list of places of historic significance (for Federal Funded Projects) the car has its own identification and significance for future Federal and State Activities.
